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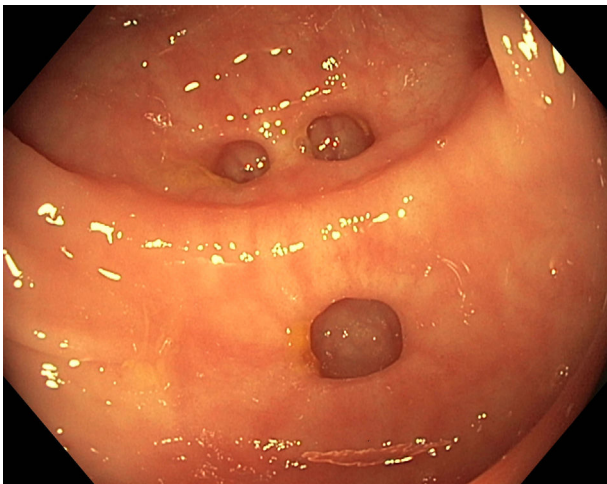


Figure 1 Colonic diverticulosis without signs of inflammation.

Colonic diverticulosis, defined as the presence of one or more diverticula in the colon, is a common condition, with a prevalence that increases with age and a number of risk

factors such as a diet that is low in fibre.^{1,2} Uncomplicated diverticula are often silent with no specific clinical picture^{3,4}; but that does not mean they cannot surprise us, as can be seen in this case, which could even be an endoscopic emoji (Fig. 1).
